Mr. Phillip Magness is an LCMS missionary to West and Central Africa, where he teaches church music and liturgy among our francophone mission partners there on a half-time basis. Stateside, he works as a free-lance liturgical musician and worship consultant. He has served as Cantor at parishes in Texas, Illinois, Oklahoma, and Missouri. Magness chaired the Introduction Committee for the *Lutheran Service Book*, and set Luther's *Small Catechism* to music for the *Growing in Christ* curriculum. He has compositions in the CPH and NPH catalogs, and has been a featured speaker and presenter at national worship conferences of the LCMS, the WELS, and Getty Music. Magness has led music for daily worship at the 2013, 2016 and 2019 LCMS conventions and is chief musician for DOXOLOGY: The Lutheran Center for Spiritual Care and Counsel. Phillip's wife, Cheryl, is Managing Editor for *Reporter*, the official newspaper of the Lutheran Church - Missouri Synod, and is also a frequent contributor to *The Federalist*. They have three children.
