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Unity of the Torah

The five 'books' of the Torah are a single literary work divided into five segments.

Unity of the Torah

The central story of the Torah is the account of the redemption of the people of Israel from their slavery in Egypt and their establishment as the people of God.

The Torah as a Whole

Genesis

- •The 'Old Testament' of the Torah
- The backstory of the drama of redemption

Genesis

 Lays the foundations for the theology of the OT (and NT).

Genesis as Backstory

- Reveals Yahweh is the creator of all things.
- Explains the need to redeem fallen creation.

Genesis as Backstory

- How God called Abraham as the ancestor of His people.
- Explains how the Hebrews came to be in Egypt.

Exodus

- Chs. 1-15: the drama of redemption
- Chs. 16-40: learning what it means to be the people of Yahweh

Leviticus

- Receiving instruction on how to live as the people of God
- Continues instruction given beginning in Exodus 20–23

Leviticus

Contains both religious and civil regulation

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Numbers

Israel leaves Sinai to journey to the land of promise.

- Israel lives as Yahweh's people
- Yahweh fights for His people
- Yahweh fulfills His promises
- Israel encounters temptation

Deuteronomy

Homiletical review of God's work and teaching:

- Who is Yahweh?
- Who is Israel, and how should Israel live as the people of Yahweh?
- Prepare to receive the gift of the land

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The Torah

A single literary work in five segments that tells the central story of the account of the redemption of the people of Israel from slavery in Egypt and their establishment as the people of God.

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
