L: For complicity in systems of privilege and power over those whose skin color, culture, and ethnicity differ from those of the majority, even today: **C:** Forgive us, compassionate God.

L: Grant us courage never to let a racist joke pass in our hearing, commitment to insist on the treatment of all persons and groups with dignity—including ourselves if oppressed—even at the risk of being unpopular or misunderstood:

L: Grant us patience in enduring periods of non-action, persistence in resisting the evil of radical oppression, and faithfulness in working toward racial justice among your people, in the church, and in the world:

C: We beseech you, God of hope.

C: We beseech you, God of grace.

L: We pray in the name of your Son Jesus, himself the bread of justice and the cup of solidarity, our life and our hope.

C: Amen.
