# INSTALLATION OF DR. THOMAS J. EGGER

Dr. Thomas J. Egger is president of Concordia Seminary, St. Louis. He also is the Gustav and Sophie Butterbach Professor of Exegetical Theology.

Before being named the 11th president of Concordia Seminary in 2021, Egger was installed in the Butterbach chair and was appointed as chairman of the Department of Exegetical Theology. He also has served as associate professor of Exegetical Theology and as academic adviser for first-year students. He has been a faculty member since 2005.

Previously, Egger served as pastor at Zion Lutheran Church in Storm Lake, Iowa, from 2000-05. Also, he served as a guest instructor at Concordia Lutheran Seminary in Edmonton, Alberta, Canada, in 1999.

Egger earned his Doctor of Philosophy (Ph.D.) and Master of Divinity (M.Div.) (2019, 1997) from Concordia Seminary. He received a Bachelor of Arts (B.A.) in English and German from Central College in Pella, Iowa (1993).

His areas of interest and expertise include biblical Hebrew, the books of Genesis and Exodus, Old Testament theology, Old Testament Christ-typology, divine justice, narrative and rhetorical analysis, the nature and authority of Scripture, and "objectionable" texts in the Bible (those often raising criticisms of divine violence and accusations of divine immorality).

He also has made contributions in the area of American Lutheran history, especially the history of The Lutheran Church—Missouri Synod (LCMS) and its first president, Dr. C.F.W. Walther. Another area of special interest is the theology of Luther's catechisms and the intersection of the catechism and the Bible in Lutheran teaching and piety.

He has written articles for a number of publications, including *Concordia Journal, Modern Reformation, Journal of the Evangelical Theological Society, Concordia Pulpit Resources* and *The Lutheran Witness*, and pieces for the LCMS Commission on Theology and Church Relations (CTCR).

Egger currently serves on the Concordia Historical Institute (CHI) Awards Committee. He previously served on the Board of Regents for Concordia University Chicago, River Forest, Ill. He served three terms on the CTCR and was part of the seven-member LCMS Catechism Revision Committee, which prepared the 2017 revision of the Synod's explanation of Luther's Small Catechism. For 10 years, he served on the Board of Directors of Providence Classical Christian Academy, a K–12 school in St. Louis.

His favorite pastimes are running, Cardinals baseball, birdwatching, hiking, golf, reading stories and poetry to his children, and singing hymns with his family. He and his wife, Victoria, live on campus and have six children: Andrew, Stacey, Abram, Bonnie, Ellen and Mary.

# INSTALLATION OF DR. JOEL ELOWSKY

Dr. Joel Elowsky is dean of Advanced Studies at Concordia Seminary, St. Louis. He also is professor of Historical Theology, coordinator of International Seminary Exchange Programs and director of the Seminary's Center for the Study of Early Christian Texts. He has been a faculty member at Concordia Seminary since 2014.

His interests and areas of expertise include early church studies, the history of exegesis, mission work and African Christianity.

He received a Master of Divinity (M.Div.) and Master of Sacred Theology (S.T.M.) from Concordia Seminary (1990, 1992). He later earned a Master of Philosophy (M.Phil.) and Doctor of Philosophy (Ph.D.) from Drew University in Madison, N.J. (2008, 2009). He received a Bachelor of Arts (B.A.) from Concordia College in Ann Arbor, Mich. (now Concordia University, Ann Arbor) (1985). Elowsky previously served as associate professor of theology at Concordia University Wisconsin, Mequon (2010–14); as adjunct professor of religion at Drew University (2000–04); and as research director at the Center for Early African Christianity at Eastern University in St. Davids, Pa. (2009–14).

Elowsky's first call was with The Lutheran Church—Missouri Synod (LCMS) S.E.L.C. District as a mission developer in Galloway Township, N.J. (1992–2000). He served as operations manager/research director for Thomas Oden's 29-volume *Ancient Christian Commentary on Scripture* (InterVarsity Press) from 2000–10, which has been translated into at least seven languages. He also served several vacancy positions in New Jersey.

He has edited or authored numerous books and articles, including the following: John 1–10: New Testament Volume IVa in the Ancient Christian Commentary on Scripture series (InterVarsity Press, 2007); John 11–21: New Testament Volume IVb in the Ancient Christian Commentary on Scripture series (InterVarsity Press, 2007); We Believe in the Holy Spirit: Vol. 4 in the Ancient Christian Doctrine series (InterVarsity Press, 2009); the three-volume Encyclopedia of Ancient Christianity, eds. Angelo Di Berardino, Thomas C. Oden, Joel C. Elowsky and James Hoover (InterVarsity Press, 2014); Cyril of Alexandria: Commentary on John, Vols. I and II in the Ancient Christian Texts series, trans. David R. Maxwell, ed. Joel C. Elowsky (InterVarsity Press, 2013 and 2015); "Exodus in the Fathers" in The Book of Exodus: Composition, Reception, and Interpretation, Vol. 164 in the Supplements to Vetus Testamentum series, eds. Thomas B. Dozeman, Craig A. Evans and Joel N. Lohr (Brill, 2014); "Alexandrian Theology and Contemporary African Christian Thought: From Cape to Cairo, ed. David Tonghou Ngong (Routledge, 2016); and Letter to Marcellinus on the Psalms: Spiritual Wisdom for Today. New Haven, CT: ICCSPress, 2017.

Elowsky and his wife, Joy, live in Ladue, Mo., and have two sons, Christian and Luke. When not traveling or teaching, Elowsky likes to spend time sailing in northern Michigan.

# INSTALLATION OF DR. KEVIN GOLDEN

Dr. Kevin Golden is associate professor of Exegetical Theology at Concordia Seminary, St. Louis. He joined the faculty earlier this year.

Previously, he served as pastor of Village Lutheran Church, Ladue, Mo. (2009-21), and as pastor of Grace Lutheran Church, Holts Summit, Mo. (2002-09). Golden taught at Calvary Lutheran High School, Jefferson City, Mo. (2005-09). He also served as a guest instructor at Concordia Theological Seminary, Fort Wayne, Ind. (2007, 2009), and at Concordia Seminary, (2000-02; 2009-14; 2017-21) teaching Greek and Hebrew. He served as the research assistant to Dr. James W. Voelz, the Dr. Jack Dean Kingsbury Professor of New Testament Theology at Concordia Seminary (2000-02).

Golden earned his Doctor of Philosophy (Ph.D.) and his Master of Divinity (M.Div.) from Concordia Seminary (2010, 1999). In 1995, Golden received a Bachelor of Arts (B.A.) in antiquities and religious studies, graduating *summa cum laude* from the Honors College at Missouri State University, Springfield, Mo.

Golden's areas of interest and expertise include Hosea and biblical usage of the divine name, Genesis 6-9, Jonah, the Book of the Twelve (Minor Prophets) and biblical intertextuality.

He is the author of *Blessed Be His Name: Revealing the Sacred Names of God* (Concordia Publishing House, 2021), *God's Own Son Is Born A Child* (Concordia Publishing House, 2019) and *LifeLight: Minor Prophets* (Concordia Publishing House, 2009). He contributed to the *festschrift, The Mercy of God in the Cross of Christ: Essays on Mercy in Honor of Glenn Merritt* (LCMS, 2016). He is a frequent contributor to the *Concordia Theological Quarterly* and *Concordia Pulpit Resources*.

Golden has been affiliated with the Society of Biblical Literature since 2003. He is the second vice-president of The Lutheran Church—Missouri Synod (LCMS) Missouri District (2012-15; 2018-present), and has served on the district's finance committee and as an advisory member of the district's board of directors and for the board for family life and youth ministry. He has served in a variety of roles for Humanitri, St. Louis, including serving on the board of directors (2013-20); as chairman of the advancement committee (2016-17); as chairman of the jail chaplaincy committee (2017-19); and as secretary of the board (2018–20). He also has served on a number of other organizational boards and in pastoral roles such as chaplain and adviser.

Golden and his wife, Joy, live in Olivette, Mo. They have four daughters: Claire, Daphne, Juliet and Fiona; and three sons: Paul, James and Titus.

# INSTALLATION OF DR. ERIK HERRMANN

Dr. Erik Herrmann is dean of Theological Research and Publication at Concordia Seminary, St. Louis. He also is professor of Historical Theology and director of the Seminary's Center for Reformation Research.

Herrmann joined the faculty of Concordia Seminary in 2005 after serving as an assistant pastor at Timothy Lutheran Church in St. Louis. He received his Doctor of Philosophy (Ph.D.) and Master of Divinity (M.Div.) from Concordia Seminary (2005, 2000). His earned his Bachelor of Arts (B.A.) from Concordia University Wisconsin, Mequon (1995).

His areas of interest and expertise include the history of biblical interpretation, with a particular focus on Martin Luther and the Reformation period; history of Medieval and Reformation/early modern Europe; 20th century interpretations of Martin Luther and his theology; and the history of American Lutheranism.

He has served as a guest lecturer at *Seminário Concórdia*, São Leopoldo, Brazil; Mekane Yesus Seminary, Addis Ababa, Ethiopia; the Luther Academy in Riga, Latvia; the *Församlingsfakulteten* in Göteborg, Sweden; and the Comenius University of Bratislava, Slovakia. He was a post-doctoral *Stipendiat* at the *Insitut für Europäische Geschichte* in Mainz, Germany, in the summer of 2006.

His writing works include "The Babylonian Captivity of the Church" in *The Annotated Luther: Church and Sacraments*, vol. 3 (Fortress Press); "Preface to the Wittenberg Edition of Luther's German Writings, 1539" in *The Annotated Luther: Pastoral Writings*, volume 4 (Fortress Press, 2016); "Living in the Promises and Places of God: A Theology of the World" with Dr. Charles Arand in the spring 2015 issue of *Concordia Journal*; and "Luther's Absorption of Medieval Biblical Interpretation and His Use of the Church Fathers" in *The Oxford Handbook to the Theology of Martin Luther* (Oxford University Press, 2014). He also edited the "Preface to Andreas Bodenstein von Karlstadt, Defense against the False Charge of Rebellion (1525)" and "Preface to Andreas Bodenstein von Karlstadt, Explanation of How Karlstadt Understands His Teaching concerning the Lord's Supper and Other Teachings, and How He Wants Them to Be Understood, (1525)," both of which were published in *Luther's Works*, volume 59 (Concordia Publishing House, 2012).

Herrmann and his wife, Aliesha, live in Eureka, Mo., and have five children: Augustine, Constansa, Mathias, Tobias and Elspeth.

# INSTALLATION OF DR. DAVID LEWIS

Dr. David Lewis is director of the Master of Divinity and Residential Alternate Route Programs at Concordia Seminary, St. Louis. He also is associate professor of Exegetical Theology and adviser to the Student Association.

Lewis has been a faculty member since 2004.

His areas of interest and expertise include biblical Greek, hermeneutics, the Synoptic Gospels (in particular the Gospel of Mark) and narrative criticism.

He received a Doctor of Philosophy (Ph.D.), Master of Sacred Theology (S.T.M.) and Master of Divinity (M.Div.) from Concordia Seminary (2020, 1998, 1994). He received a Bachelor of Arts (B.A.) from California State University in Fullerton, Calif. (1988).

Previously, he was pastor of Grace Lutheran Church in Crescent City, Calif. (1998-2004) and served as a guest instructor at Concordia Seminary (1995-98, 2003).

His writing works include "Cinema and the American Mind" in *The American Mind Meets the Mind of Christ* (Concordia Seminary Press, 2010).

Lewis has a passion for movies and often hosts "Christ and Film" nights on campus for students. His long-standing dream of having a film festival on campus came true when the Seminary held its first Faith and Film Festival in 2019.

He and his wife, Karen, live on campus and have three children: John, Marissa and Courtney. He enjoys cinema and film analysis, wine, grilling and spending time with his family.

# INSTALLATION OF DR. GLENN NIELSEN

Dr. Glenn Nielsen is director of certification at Concordia Seminary, St. Louis. He also is director of Placement, director of Vicarage and Deaconess Internships, and professor of Practical Theology.

Nielsen has been a faculty member since 1990.

His areas of interest and expertise include communication, rhetoric and homiletics. Particularly, Nielsen has studied the use of creative means within a sermon.

Nielsen received his Master of Divinity (M.Div.), and Master of Sacred Theology (S.T.M.) from Concordia Seminary (1981, 1987). He also holds a Bachelor of Arts (B.A.) from Valparaiso University in Valparaiso, Ind. (1977), and a Master of Arts (M.A.) and a Doctor of Philosophy (Ph.D.) from Northwestern University in Chicago, Ill. (1989, 1993).

Nielsen published the LifeLight™ Foundations Bible Study: Miracles and study notes for Psalms 90-105 in the Lutheran Study Bible for Concordia Publishing House. He published A Living, Daring Confidence: A Worship Series on Romans, a worship and preaching CD, through Creative Communications for the Parish. He contributed the chapter "Evaluating and Extending the Research Implications" in The Pastor's Brain Manual: A Fascinating Work in Progress (Lutheran University Press, 2015). He also has submitted numerous sermon studies for Concordia Pulpit Resources and has prepared the module on sermon application for The Lutheran Church—Missouri Synod's (LCMS) Preach the Word series. He contributed several long-form articles to Concordia Theology on medicine, habitus, preaching and the Comfort Dog ministry. He also contributed a chapter to Let the Gospel Lead: Essays and Sermons in Honor of Dale A. Meyer, performing an anatomy of one of Meyer's sermons (Concordia Publishing House, 2020).

Nielsen and his wife, Sue, are handlers for Noah, a Lutheran Church Charities' K-9 Comfort Dog who is part of a compassion ministry of Timothy Lutheran Church in St. Louis, Mo. Noah Comfort Dog travels to churches, schools, nursing homes, hospitals and events in the St. Louis area. He also can be deployed in disaster response situations.

The Nielsens live in Des Peres, Mo., and have four children: Holly, Matthew (who is in eternal rest with our Lord), Timothy and Beth. Nielsen enjoys spending time with his family, including his four grandchildren, caring for his yard and garden, doing crossword puzzles and taking Noah for daily walks.

# INSTALLATION OF DR. ELY PRIETO

Dr. Ely Prieto is associate professor of Practical Theology, Lutheran Foundation Professor of Urban and Cross-Cultural Ministry, and associate dean for Urban and Cross-Cultural Ministry at Concordia Seminary, St. Louis. He joined the faculty earlier this year.

He received his Doctor of Ministry (D.Min.) from Concordia Seminary (2009) and a Master of Sacred Theology (S.T. M.) from Concordia Theological Seminary, Fort Wayne, Ind. (1993). He holds a Bachelor of Theology (B.Theol.) from Lutheran University of Brazil, Canoas, Rio Grande do Sul, Brazil (2016); and a Bachelor of Theology (B.D.) from *Seminário Concórdia*, Porto Alegre, Rio Grande do Sul, Brazil (1983).

In addition to his earned degrees, Prieto received special training in ministry to people who are deaf at Concordia Seminary (1984).

Before coming to Concordia Seminary, Prieto served as the executive director/urban mission developer at Lutheran Intercity Network Coalition – San Antonio, Texas (LINC-SA) (2011-21); and as a vacancy pastor at Christ Our Savior Lutheran Church, San Antonio (2009-21). Previously, he served as assistant pastor and director of world missions at Concordia Lutheran Church, San Antonio (2001-11); senior pastor at Congregação São Paulo, Arroio do Meio, RS, Brazil (1993-96); and assistant pastor at Congregação São Paulo, Porto Alegre, RS, Brazil (1984-91) as well as school chaplain and missionary-at-large for the deaf (1984-91).

Prieto served as professor of practical theology while at *Seminário Concórdia*, São Leopoldo, RS, Brazil (1996-2000), teaching in the areas of homiletics, pastoral theology, church planning and administration. In that position he ministered to people with special needs, and served in mission and evangelism, theology and stewardship as well as vicarage preparation. While at *Seminário Concórdia*, he was the director of field education, the director of vicarage and the supervisor for the Seminary Mission Laboratory. Prieto also was professor of Theology at ULBRA (Lutheran University of Brazil) Canoas, RS (July 1996-2000), where he taught rhetoric and speech, evangelism and stewardship, world religions and Christian ethics. From 2012-15, Prieto lectured about Lutheran worship at the Baptist University of Americas and Logsdon Seminary in San Antonio. He has served as a pastor in residence throughout Brazil and Argentina, ministering to people with special needs, including those who are deaf. Prieto is fluent in Portuguese, English and Brazilian sign language (LIBRAS).

Prieto was one of the editors of *O Povo de Deus (A Festschrift in Honor of Rev. Dr. Acir Raymann)*, *Editorial Concordia*, 2014). He has contributed chapters for a variety of published books, articles, book reviews, homiletical and sermonic studies and sermons.

Prieto and his wife, Miriam, live on campus and have two children, Filipe and Natalia. He enjoys listening to music, playing guitar, reading, watching movies with his family and cooking for family and friends.

# INSTALLATION OF DR. JON VIEKER

Dr. Jon Vieker is associate professor of Practical Theology and dean of chapel at Concordia Seminary, St. Louis. He joined the faculty earlier this month.

His areas of academic interest include the study of hymns, hymn writers, and hymnals of The Lutheran Church—Missouri Synod (LCMS), especially as viewed through the history of American Lutheranism and the wider American ecclesial context.
