

READINGS

First Reading 1 Thessalonians 2:1–12

L A reading from 1 Thessalonians, the second chapter.

For you yourselves know, brothers, that our coming to you was not in vain. But though we had already suffered and been shamefully treated at Philippi, as you know, we had boldness in our God to declare to you the gospel of God in the midst of much conflict. For our appeal does not spring from error or impurity or any attempt to deceive, but just as we have been approved by God to be entrusted with the gospel, so we speak, not to please man, but to please God who tests our hearts. For we never came with words of flattery, as you know, nor with a pretext for greed—God is witness. Nor did we seek glory from people, whether from you or from others, though we could have made demands as apostles of Christ. But we were gentle among you, like a nursing mother taking care of her own children. So, being affectionately desirous of you, we were ready to share with you not only the gospel of God but also our own selves, because you had become very dear to us.

For you remember, brothers, our labor and toil: we worked night and day, that we might not be a burden to any of you, while we proclaimed to you the gospel of God. You are witnesses, and God also, how holy and righteous and blameless was our conduct toward you believers. For you know how, like a father with his children, we exhorted each one of you and encouraged you and charged you to walk in a manner worthy of God, who calls you into his own kingdom and glory.





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INSTALLATION OF DR. DAVID ADAMS

Dr. David L. Adams is the W.G. Ray and Louis J. Rechtzigel Professor of Biblical Studies at Concordia Seminary, St. Louis.

A faculty member since 2000, he is a professor of Exegetical Theology. He became the first occupant of the Ray-Rechtzigel endowed chair in 2022. His areas of interest and expertise include biblical theology, ancient Near Eastern culture and religion, biblical archaeology and government activity as it relates to religion.

As former director of the Concordia Center for Archaeology, Adams was engaged for several years as a member of the excavation staff at *Khirbet Qeiyafa* in Israel. This area is associated with the place of the battle between David and Goliath.

Before coming to Concordia Seminary, Adams served as executive director of the Office of Government Information for The Lutheran Church—Missouri Synod (LCMS) in Washington, D.C. There he helped monitor legislative, judicial and executive branch activity that could have affected the ministry of the church.

A recipient of the Tyndale Fellowship, Adams holds a Doctor of Philosophy (Ph.D.) from Cambridge University in Cambridge, England (1997). He earned a Master of Divinity (M.Div.) and Master of Sacred Theology (S.T.M.) from Concordia Seminary (1981, 1983). Adams received his Bachelor of Arts (B.A.) from Concordia Senior College in Fort Wayne, Ind. (1977), and graduated with an Associate of Arts (A.A.) from St. Paul's College in Concordia, Mo. (1975).

Adams is the co-editor of *The Anonymous God* (Concordia Publishing, 2004), a volume of essays on the subject of civil religion and American society. He has prepared study notes and materials on the psalms and wisdom literature for the *ESV Archaeology Study Bible* (Crossway, 2018). Among his current projects is a book examining the concept of the presence of God in the Bible in comparison to Israel's ancient Near Eastern neighbors and its significance for biblical theology.

Previously, Adams was assistant professor of religion and philosophy at Concordia College in Ann Arbor, Mich., where he taught Hebrew, philosophy, biblical studies and was director of the Pre-Seminary Education Program. Before that, he served as manager of Microcomputer Services for the LCMS Office of Information Systems. He also has served in parish ministry as pastor of St. Peter Lutheran Church in Caseyville, Ill., and as vacancy pastor of a number of congregations through the years.

His hobbies include reading, playing guitar and scuba diving.

Adams and his wife, Lisa, live in St. Louis.

INSTALLATION OF DR. JOEL ELOWSKY

Dr. Joel Elowsky is the Frank and Valerie Fuerst Professor of Historical Theology at Concordia Seminary, St. Louis.

He also is professor of Historical Theology, dean of Advanced Studies and coordinator of International Seminary Exchange Programs. Additionally, he serves as the director of the Seminary's Center for the Study of Early Christian Texts and is a researcher for the Center for Early African Christianity at the Oden House in New Haven, Conn. He has been a faculty member at Concordia Seminary since 2014.

His interests and areas of expertise include early church studies, the history of exegesis, mission work and African Christianity.

After studying at Westfield House in Cambridge, England, and Concordia Lutheran Theological Seminary in St. Catharines, Ontario, Canada, Elowsky transferred to Concordia Seminary, where he received a Master of Divinity (M.Div.) and Master of Sacred Theology (S.T.M.) (1990, 1992). He later earned a Master of Philosophy (M.Phil.) and Doctor of Philosophy (Ph.D.) from Drew University in Madison, N.J. (2008, 2009). He received a Bachelor of Arts (B.A.) from Concordia College in Ann Arbor, Mich. (now Concordia University, Ann Arbor) (1985).

He served as associate professor of theology at Concordia University Wisconsin, Mequon (2010–14); as adjunct professor of religion at Drew University (2000–04); and as research director at the Center for Early African Christianity at Eastern University in St. Davids, Pa. (2009–14).

Elowsky's first call was with The Lutheran Church—Missouri Synod (LCMS) SELC District as a mission developer in Galloway Township, N.J. (1992–2000). He served as operations manager/research director for Thomas Oden's 29-volume *Ancient Christian Commentary on Scripture* (ACCS) (InterVarsity Press) from 2000–10, which has been translated into at least seven languages. He also served vacancies at Trinity Lutheran Church in Morris Plains, N.J.; the Lutheran Church of the Holy Spirit in Montville, N.J.; and Our Savior Lutheran Church in Fair Lawn, N.J.

Since 2004, he has been part of the ecumenical group Evangelicals and Catholics Together. He has served as a participant in dialogues between evangelicals and the Vatican, including delivering a paper on Scripture and Tradition at the Pontifical Council for Promoting Christian Unity at the Vatican in 2010. He also is a board member of the China Academic Consortium and a member of the International Association of Patristic Studies and the Society of Biblical Literature. He serves as president of the Institute for Classical Christian Studies. He has lectured extensively in Africa on behalf of Concordia Seminary as a researcher and lecturer for the Center for Early African Christianity.

He helped initiate two series — the five-volume *Ancient Christian Doctrine* and the 16-volume *Ancient Christian Texts* (InterVarsity Press) — as well as *Ancient Christian Devotional: A Year of Weekly Readings* (InterVarsity Press, 2007).

He has edited or authored numerous books and articles, including: John 1–10: New Testament Volume IVa in the ACCS series (InterVarsity Press, 2007); John 11–21: New Testament Volume IVb in the ACCS series (InterVarsity Press, 2007); We Believe in the Holy Spirit: Vol. 4 in the Ancient Christian Doctrine series (InterVarsity Press, 2009); the three-volume Encyclopedia of Ancient Christianity, eds. Angelo Di Berardino, Thomas C. Oden, Joel C. Elowsky and James Hoover (InterVarsity Press, 2014); Cyril of Alexandria: Commentary on John, Vols. I and II in the Ancient Christian Texts series, trans. David R. Maxwell, ed. Joel C. Elowsky (InterVarsity Press, 2013 and 2015); "Exodus in the Fathers" in The Book of Exodus: Composition, Reception, and Interpretation, Vol. 164 in the Supplements to Vetus Testamentum series, eds. Thomas B. Dozeman, Craig A. Evans and Joel N. Lohr (Brill, 2014); "Alexandrian Theology and Contemporary African Christian Thought" in A New History of African Christian Thought: From Cape to Cairo, ed. David Tonghou Ngong (Routledge, 2016); and Letter to Marcellinus on the Psalms: Spiritual Wisdom for Today (New Haven, CT: ICCSPress, 2017). He also has been invited to be co-editor with Brian Brewer for a new series with T&T Clark on historical theology.

Elowsky's translation of Athanasius' Letter to Marcellinus was used in the Africa Study Bible (Tyndale House, 2017). He published the article "Libya" in Brill Encyclopedia of Early Christianity Online (Brill, 2020) and has completed an article on Moses for the same publication. He was a consultant for the "60 Minutes" segment on the churches of Lalibela, which aired in November 2019. He edited Dr. David Maxwell's translation of fragments of Cyril's Commentary on Romans and 1 & 2 Corinthians for the Ancient Christian Text series, published by InterVarsity Press in the spring of 2022. He lectured in the summer of 2022 at the Patristics Center at the University of Cluj in Romania and helped to secure a grant from the Vatican for the ACCS series to be translated into Romanian and Hungarian. He edited an English translation of Angelo DiBerardino's lectures on the Institutions of the Early Church (ICCSPress, 2021) and is working on other volumes with DiBerardino for future publication.

Elowsky's wife, Joy, has played organ for chapel services at Concordia Seminary. She also is the full-time director of music at Holy Cross Lutheran Church and School in Collinsville, Ill. The Elowskys have two sons: Christian, a software developer in Wisconsin, and Luke, a graduate of Concordia Seminary who is married to Julianna (Pfeiffer). When not traveling or teaching, Elowsky likes to spend time sailing in northern Michigan.

INSTALLATION OF DR. RONALD MUDGE

Dr. Ronald Mudge is provost and chief academic officer and professor of Exegetical Theology at Concordia Seminary, St. Louis.

Before joining the faculty of Concordia Seminary in 2022, Mudge served at Concordia University Wisconsin, Mequon (CUW), for 15 years, most recently as the Rouse Professor of Pre-Seminary Studies (2019–22) and director of the pre-seminary program (2010–22). He also served as the Rouse Associate Professor of Pre-Seminary Studies (2013–19) and as an assistant professor of theology (2007–13).

In 2012, Mudge earned a Doctor of Philosophy (Ph.D.) from Concordia Seminary. His dissertation was "Honorable Shame: The Rhetorical Use of Didactic Shame Discourse in Ezekiel 36:16–32." He also received a Master of Divinity (M.Div.) from Concordia Seminary (1996) and a Bachelor of Arts in English and music from the University of Michigan-Flint (1992).

Before joining the faculty at CUW, Mudge was a missionary in French-speaking Africa (1996–2006), serving as the coordinator of theological education and as an adjunct professor of exegetical and systematic theology at the *Centre Luthérien d'Etudes Théologiques* (The Lutheran Center for Theological Studies).

Mudge has been a member of the Society of Biblical Literature since 2013. He has published works in various blogs and journals, has been interviewed by several newspapers and magazines, and is a sought-after presenter for conferences and lectures.

His areas of interest and expertise include Old Testament prophetic books, biblical responses to popular culture, shame as addressed in the Bible, biblical Greek and Hebrew, and using anthropology and sociology in biblical studies and missions. He currently is conducting research for a scholarly Lutheran commentary on Zephaniah.

In his free time, Mudge enjoys running, playing and watching sports, viewing old movies, reading fiction and nonfiction, and preparing and eating pasta dishes. He and his wife, Lisa, find joy in encouraging their children in their vocations and their activities and in taking quiet family vacations in Door County, Wis. They have six children: Jonah, Isaiah, Ella, Aaron, Nathan and Elijah.

INSTALLATION OF DR. TIMOTHY SALESKA

Dr. Timothy E. Saleska is the Gustav and Sophie Butterbach Professor of Exegetical Theology at Concordia Seminary, St. Louis.

He also serves as professor of Exegetical Theology and dean of Ministerial Formation. Saleska has been a faculty member since 1997. He was named dean of Ministerial Formation in 2011. He previously served as acting placement counselor (2004–07), editor of *Concordia Theology Online* (2006–08) and director of the Master of Divinity (M.Div.) and residential certificate programs (2008–11).

His areas of interest and expertise include Hebrew and the history of exegesis. He is particularly interested in the Book of Psalms, namely how Christians read and meditate on the psalms and the history of the psalms' interpretation in the church. He also has an interest in examining how Christians interpret the Bible in general and how pastors can form faithful readers of God's Word and remain faithful themselves.

Before joining the Seminary, Saleska served as pastor of Peace Lutheran Church in Cincinnati, Ohio (1982–95), and St. Paul Lutheran Church in Napoleon, Ohio (1995–97).

He received his Master of Divinity (M.Div.) from Concordia Seminary (1982). He also holds an Associate of Arts (A.A.) from St. John's College, Winfield, Kan. (1976); a Bachelor of Arts (B.A.) from Concordia College, Ann Arbor, Mich. (now Concordia University, Ann Arbor) (1978); and a Master of Philosophy (M.Phil.) and a Doctor of Philosophy (Ph.D.) from Hebrew Union College, Cincinnati, Ohio (1992, 1999).

Saleska is the author of the first volume of commentary on the Psalms, Psalms 1–50, in the Concordia Commentary Series (Concordia Publishing House, 2020). He also is the author of the Bible study God's Abiding Word: Psalms (Concordia Publishing House, 2002). Saleska contributed to The Lectionary Commentary (Wm. B. Eerdmans Publishing Co., 2005) and wrote "Reading Psalm 1 in the Context of the Psalter: Voices in Conversation" in Listening to the Word of God: Exegetical Approaches (Edition Ruprecht, 2016). He also offered commentary for The Lectionary Commentary: Theological Exegesis for Sunday's Texts (Wm. B. Eerdmans Publishing Co., 2001) and the article "The Uses of Scripture in the Christian Community" in Inviting Community (Concordia Seminary Press, 2013). In addition, Saleska has contributed numerous articles and reviews to Concordia Journal and wrote The Gospel-Centered Christian (Concordia Seminary Press, 2018).

Saleska and his wife, Diane, have three grown children and seven grandchildren. He enjoys participating in sports of all kinds, especially basketball, softball, tennis, biking, walking, hiking and swimming. Saleska loves to read, watch movies and listen to podcasts. After being the head basketball coach for the Concordia Preachers for 11 years, he is now the assistant coach.

INSTALLATION OF DCE CAITLIN DINGER

Director of Christian Education Caitlin Dinger is the administrative assistant for distance programs at Concordia Seminary, St. Louis.

Originally from San Francisco, Calif., Dinger graduated from Concordia University, Portland, Ore. (1996), where she earned a Bachelor of Arts (B.A.) in education and certification as a Director of Christian Education (DCE). She served her internship and first call as a DCE at Beautiful Savior Lutheran Church in Spokane, Wash. (1996–98). She then moved to Camp Lutherwood in Bellingham, Wash., in 1998 and served as program director until 2000.

Dinger pursued an advanced degree at Pacific Lutheran Theological Seminary where she completed a Master of Divinity (M.Div.) in 2003. Following graduation, she served as DCE at Faith Lutheran Church in Pleasant Hill, Calif. (2003–07), where she directed Christian education programs, youth ministry and the congregation's Summer Day Camp Adventures program that provided community outreach and youth leadership development.

Dinger also has served as DCE at Christ Memorial Lutheran Church in East Brunswick, N.J. (2008–13), as well as the communications coordinator and Christian education specialist for The Lutheran Church—Missouri Synod (LCMS) New Jersey District (2008–18). She is an LCMS commissioned and rostered worker.

Dinger and her husband, Andrew (M.Div. '07), live in St. Louis and have three sons: John, Jacob and Daniel. Andrew is lead pastor at Timothy Lutheran Church in St. Louis.

INSTALLATION OF REV. JESSE KUEKER

Rev. Jesse Kueker is an admissions officer at Concordia Seminary, St. Louis.

Kueker earned a Master of Divinity (M.Div.) from Concordia Seminary (2015) and a Bachelor of Arts (B.A.) in biblical studies from Southwest Baptist University, Bolivar, Mo. (2010).

Upon graduating from the Seminary, Kueker was called to be the sole pastor of Trinity Lutheran Church in Clinton, Mo. During his pastorate, the church developed and launched several community outreach programs including three maternity homes, a BBQ food truck and a classical Lutheran afterschool program.

In January 2022, Kueker accepted the call to be an admissions officer, a role in which he builds relationships with prospective seminarians from the eastern half of the United States, prays for the church's ongoing needs of faithful workers and helps students discern vocation and ministry interests.

He and his wife, Alyssa, have four children: Addison, Levi, Mackenzie and Creed. They are all St. Louis Cardinals fans, and they enjoy raising chickens, gardening and playing games together.

INSTALLATION OF REV. THOMAS SCHLUND

Rev. Thomas Schlund serves as an admissions officer at Concordia Seminary, St. Louis.

He graduated with a Master of Divinity (M.Div.) from Concordia Seminary (2015), a Master of Education (M.Ed.) in higher education administration from Texas Tech University in Lubbock, Texas (2009), and a Bachelor of Science (B.S.) in business administration from the University of Nebraska at Kearney in Kearney, Neb. (2006).

Dr. Vilson Scholz is a visiting professor of Exegetical Theology at Concordia Seminary, St. Louis from São Leopoldo, RS, Brazil.

Scholz earned a Bachelor in Theology from *Seminario Concordia* and *Universidade Luterana do Brasil* (ULBRA) (1978, 2016). He earned a Master of Sacred Theology (S.T.M.) and a Doctor of Theology (Th.D.) from Concordia Seminary, St. Louis (1981, 1993), which included his thesis titled, "The Ministry of Jesus Christ as the Fulfillment of the Servant Prophecies of Isaiah," advised by Erich H. Kiehl, and his dissertation titled, "Reading 2 Corinthians 3:4–18 – An Exercise in Exegesis," advised by Dr. James W. Voelz.

Before his current term as visiting professor at Concordia Seminary, Scholz served as a translation consultant for United Bible Societies (2000–20), a professor of biblical theology at *Seminario Concordia* (1985–2021) and ULBRA (Lutheran University of Brazil) (1994–2020), and was a visiting professor of exegetical theology at Concordia Seminary (1996–99).

His writings include: "The Newer Greek Text of the New Testament (NA28 and UBS5) and Its Implications for Translation," in *The Bible Translator*, Vol. 72, Issue 3 (2021); *Novo Testamento Interlinear Grego-Portugues (Greek-Portuguese Interlinear New Testament)*, Second edition (2019); *Principios de Interpretação Biblica (Principles of Biblical Interpretation)*, Second edition (2018); 40 anos de Biblia na Linguagem de Hoje (40 Years of the New Testament in Today's Portuguese) (2013); and Dicionario Grego-Portugues do Novo Testamento Grego (A Short Greek-Portuguese Lexicon of New Testament Greek) (2009).

In addition, Scholz has contributed to several projects, including revising a major portion (six out of eight documents) of the Portuguese translation of the *Book of Concord* (original publication, 1580; first Portuguese translation, 1980) on the basis of the original German and/or Latin (2021); serving as a translation consultant and main biblical expert in the revision of the whole Portuguese Bible on the basis of the original text in Hebrew and Greek (2013–17); serving as a voluntary consultant for a translation project (New Testament) in Hunsrik (a Low German language spoken in South America) (2020–21); and a unique translation into Portuguese of *Louw-Nida's Greek-English Lexicon of the New Testament Based on Semantic Domains* (2013). Other significant translations into Portuguese include: *The Text of the New Testament*, Aland-Aland (2013); *Der Text des Alten Testaments* (*The Text of the Old Testament*; translated from German), Alexander Achilles Fischer (2013); and *Textual Guide to the Greek New Testament*, Roger Omanson (2010). He is working on a commentary of 2 Corinthians for the *Concordia Commentary Series*.
