Because Holy Communion is a confession of the faith which is confessed at this altar, any who are not yet instructed, in doubt, or who hold a confession differing from that of The Lutheran Church—Missouri Synod and so are unable to receive the Sacrament are invited to meditate on God's Word in the distribution hymns and pray for the day when divisions will have ceased.



Notes Regarding Communion

- The campus Lord's Supper is sponsored and hosted by St. John Lutheran Church in Columbus, NE and Pastor Brad Birtell.
- When receiving the cup to partake of Christ Jesus' blood, please place your hand on the cup in some way to assist the server in guiding it to your mouth. Depending upon how those distributing the cup are holding it, you can either take hold of the cup at the base or on the bottom OR on the stem of the chalice OR at the bowl itself on the upper part. By doing so you will assist the server and help to prevent any unwelcome spillage.
- The Reliquary (unconsecrated, additional bread) will be distributed after the service in the narthex if there is sufficient quantity. You are invited to take a piece with you.
- If you would prefer not to drink wine directly from the chalice, you may intinct the bread by dipping it into the chalice.
- If you have a gluten allergy or any other special need, please contact Dean of the Chapel Kent Burreson.
- The concluding prayers are spoken by the assembly in the hope that these traditional collects might become part of your remembered repertoire of prayer

Chaplain Sieveking will offer confession and absolution in the Chapel of St. Eunice and St. Lois from 12:00-1:00 pm on Thursday.





Notes on the Service

Divine Service Setting Five in LSB represents a ritual attempt to combine Luther's Latin Mass with his German Mass, a practice common in the lands of the Augsburg Confession into the 18th Century. We use it today to celebrate the divine service and so remember the church's life in the Word throughout the ages, especially at the time of the Reformation as we begin observation of its 500th Anniversary, and to give thanks for those same gifts of the Word—heard, seen, and eaten—today. Luther's German Mass used German language canticles with tunes familiar in German culture to proclaim, remember, and give thanks. While we might be burdening you with "Luther and 16th century tune overload" today, enter the words and tunes as you are able and remember and give thanks for the gospel of Jesus Christ which Luther and the Reformers proclaimed. Through these hymns you are singing that, in the words of the Reformation motto, "The Word of the Lord stands forever." So proclaim through Luther's song: "Christ is the hope and saving light of those in blindness; He guides and comforts those in night by his kindness."
