is the birth year of two of the founders of Concordia Seminary, together with Theodore J. Brohm commemorated in "Founders Hall," the builders of the first log cabin in Perry County.

January 2 was born Johann Friedrich Buenger. As student in Leipzig he belonged to the circle of men planning the emigration to America. After a tutorship in Dresden and the arrival in Missouri he became in 1841 teacher at Trinity School in St. Louis, in 1844 its assistant pastor, in 1847 pastor of Immanuel Church. He was President of the Western District 1863—74. His most lasting imprint on the Missouri Synod was made in the domain of inner mission and welfare. In St. Louis he founded the Lutheran Hospital, the Orphans' Home, and the Altenheim. He was one of the founders of Synod's work among the colored.

Born June 30, Ottomar Fuerbringer was a member of the same Leipzig student circle and for eight years tutored in a boys' school conducted in Germany by G. H. Loeber. In the Perry County Concordia he was teacher of classic languages and history. His pastorates were at Venedy, Illinois; Freistadt and Kirchhayn, Wisconsin; and St. Lorenz' in Frankenmuth, Michigan, beginning 1858. For 26 years he was President of the Northern District of Synod. His career revealed scholarly capacity combined with pastoral and administrative sense. His son and grandson became presidents of Concordia Seminary.

The lasting heritage of these founders is the priceless wiad of consecration to Christ, training of the mind, and concern for God's people.
