#### Reflection on Arvo Pärt's Spiegel im Spiegel

In Lent, the Church goes on a sacred pilgrimage. This journey is filled with the reading of Sacred Scripture, prayer, meditation, fasting, giving alms, and a turning from our sin. Jesus is said to have walked the *Via Dolorosa*, the way of sorrow, and as the Church's rites and ceremonies guide and shape our own baptismal journey in this season, we do something of the same. The alleluias are buried, the passion narratives are read, and the music invites repentant reflection. Arvo Pärt's *Spiegel im Spiegel* is one such piece of music. The English translation of the German title is "Mirrors and Mirrors." This refers to the visual effect that is achieved when you place two mirrors face to face, resulting in an infinite repetition of the same image.

Through Pärt's musical composition, we enter into the depth and darkness of Jesus' passion. One half of the piece is in a lower register and reflects his mournful journey to the cross. However, during Lent, the Church always has one eye on the hope of resurrection and Easter. We can see this reflected in the high and ethereal nature of the other half of the piece. Each of these halves comes together to represent the paradoxical nature of the Lenten season. We mourn as we walk alongside Christ on the *Via Dolorosa* while waiting for the Church's celebration of Christ's resurrection and exaltation, and His coming again on the Last Day.

Pärt's composition accompanies us throughout our penitential pilgrimage this Lent, repeating the same image over and over, a dual portrait of the humiliated and exalted Christ. And at the end of the piece, as the final notes also seem suspended in mid-air, we are reminded of the angel's simple, yet beautiful announcement to the women at the tomb and to us, "Why do you seek the living among the dead? He is not here, but . . ."

#### **Notes Regarding Communion**

- The campus Lord's Supper is sponsored and hosted by the The Lutheran Church of Webster Gardens and Pastors Joel Christiansen and Brian King.
- We are fed with bread that is prepared in our community.
- We drink the joyous cup of salvation from wine that is grown and produced locally, fruit of the earth that surrounds us here in Missouri, gifts of the Creator's hand. The Chapel's Red Wine is from Montelle Winery, Augusta, Missouri and the White Wine is from Blumenhof Winery, Dutzow, Missouri.
- When receiving the cup to partake of Christ Jesus' blood, please place your hand on the cup in some way to assist the server in guiding it to your mouth. Depending upon

how those distributing the cup are holding it, you can either take hold of the cup at the base on the bottom OR on the stem of the chalice OR at the bowl itself on the upper part. By doing so you will assist the server and help to prevent any unwelcome spillage.

- The Reliquary (unconsecrated, additional bread) will be distributed after the service in the narthex if there is sufficient quantity. You are invited to take a piece with you.
- If illness or other extenuating circumstances lead you not to drink wine directly from the chalice, you may intinct the bread by dipping it into the chalice.
