ABOUT TODAY'S SERVICE

Today's service aims to hold in tension two seemingly competing realities: God's promises of his mercy and the painful experiences of his people. We affirm both are true. On the one hand, God is good, the Creator of the heavens and the earth, and their ruler, and he has promised his people mercy. On the other, his people experience situations which cause frustration, disappointment, anger, doubt, sadness, and disillusionment.

This service *does not* aim to remedy this breach in our reality. Instead, it attempts to marshal the resources of God's people to give voice to the apparent distance between God's mercy and the difficulty of earthly life. Today's liturgy thus follows a pattern of the lament Psalms: we will acknowledge God's power and dominion over the earth; we will deliberately lay our laments before him; and we will resolve the service with a testimony to God's promises in Christ. Our hope is not that our lives will be magically fixed, but that we will be shaped by God's story and therein find a place for our stories, even the parts of those stories that cause us pain or anger.

We also hope this service will allow us a time to listen to the laments of our brothers and sisters in Christ. While some of us may not have any present laments, many in our family in Christ do. The litany for today's service is based on submitted laments from our community. As we lament together, we invite you to hear those laments and recognize that we all live life under the cross. Thus, we pray that these laments are not individual, but communal, and that as the family of Christ we encourage each other all the more as we see the day approaching in which all laments will be answered in the resurrection of our Lord.
