Notes on the Service

Today's service is the Good Friday Chief Service (without Communion). Good Friday is part of the sacred Triduum, the three-day observance of Christ's Passover. The name may originally have been "God's Friday," but it is certainly also "good" because of the good gifts Christ won for us on this day. Good Friday is not observed as a funeral for Christ. It is a day for repentance over sin and restrained joy and praise for the redemption Christ accomplished for us on the cross. In keeping with this character, music is kept to a minimum, though not silenced. Elaborate words of praise are omitted. The altar remains bare, having been stripped on the prior day (normally Holy Thursday). Given the solemnity of the day, silence is observed at various times in order to reflect upon the Word of God. Because the service is part of the Triduum, it has neither entrance rite nor benediction. The last verse of the concluding musical offering ensures that the final note of the service is one of triumph, for God's faithful know the end of the story. The rough-hewn wooden cross being used throughout Lent and in today's service was designed and executed by graduate Matthew Rosebrock.

Following the hymn, the presider will carry the cross through the nave to the chancel. During the procession, the Sentence of the Cross will be sung three times and **the assembly will sing the Response of Adoration** with silence for reflection intervening. Turn and follow the cross as it passes through the nave. **During the Reproaches the assembly will sing the response and the concluding hymn stanza**.


