The practice of beginning a service with two or more psalms/hymns/songs, as we often do with the Service of Word and Praise, may be foreign and seem unusual to some. But in many ways that is because we have fallen out of the practice. As the daily cycle of prayer offices developed the church tended to pile psalms/hymns/canticles of prayer, praise, and lament one on top of the other. Both Morning Prayer (Matins) and Evening Prayer (Vespers) often were sung with at least three psalms back-to-back. In our current practice of the offices we usually sing only one psalm, but still often followed by the office hymn. Yet, we have lost the pattern of singing three or more songs in a row. Our practice in the Service of Word and Praise reaches back to that older tradition.
